The Women of Advent: Drawing strength from our spiritual grandmothers

Advent can be a wonderful mix of emotions: joy, delight and anticipation. Sometimes, however, as we prepare to celebrate the miracle of Jesus' birth, we may find ourselves consumed with too many details, and even worse, sorrows of years past.

So, in this time of joyous anticipation and somber reflection, what to do about those mixed emotions? Look to the women of the Bible, especially the strong, bold, outspoken women directly connected to Jesus' birth: Hannah, Mary, Elizabeth and Anna. Collectively they dealt with the death of a son, the death of a spouse, harassment, infertility, fear, anxiety and grief. Think of them as your spiritual grandmothers, your guides in traversing difficult ground. If we ignore their stories, we miss out on a literal host of resources

Bill & Pat Fredericks: our 50 years at CLC

Our story began in June 1971 when Lisa was born. Pat and I visited several Lutheran churches in our area but we had not yet decided on a church home. The months passed. Lisa was not baptized. We had to make a decision and we chose Clairemont Lutheran Church (CLC). This year, Sunday, December 5th will be exactly 50 years since Lisa was baptized by Pastor Vance and our family became CLC members.

It was Pastor Dick Knutzen who first got us involved. In the mid-70's there were two Sunday morning adult classes. One was a traditional Bible study while the Adult Forum dealt with current events. On Pastor Dick's last Sunday he and I were walking together on our way to the Adult Forum. I asked him who would lead the class after he left. He said, "Oh, someone will step up." At the end of the class Pastor Dick announced to the group that Bill Fredericks had volunteered to lead the class.

Pastor Vern recruited me to be treasurer of the Education Committee. (Bob and Opal Boss were part of that committee. Bob actually owned and studied the works of Josephus.) Pr. Vern led a Gospel of John class that that was supposed to last 6 weeks but actually lasted 6 months. He says it affected his whole ministry because he learned that lay people were willing to study the Bible 'in depth'.

In celebration of the 30th anniversary of CLC there was a fund raising campaign, \$30K for 30Years. A poll was taken to determine where the congregation wanted to spend the funds raised. Pastor Vance remarked that he had to



preach a sermon explaining the need to modernize the bathrooms at the end of the Fellowship Hall.

Gene Holtz was pastor when the Education committee planned several Sunday school retreats at the Girl Scout camp near Julian. After the dinner dishes were washed and put away everyone gathered around the campfire and we patted our knees while Grace led us on a 'Bear Hunt'. There were annual family retreats led by Pr. Ev Nielsen (who was then Assistant to the Bishop) and also by Bishop Murray Finck. Another story that Pr. Gene tells is this; One day a young woman from the neighborhood stopped by his office and asked, "Can this be our family's church?' Thus was born a church that today worships in English Continued on Page 7

and in Spanish. That church CLC/ILC has spawned two Spanish language pastors.

Pastors Brian Taylor and David Jorstad were called to assist Pr. Gene. Pastor Brian was a trained Stephen Minister and it was during that time that the CLC Stephen Minister program was born. When Pr. Gene accepted a call to serve another congregation, Pastor Ev was called as Senior Pastor. During his tenure the Evangelism Committee spent a year studying with a team of church growth consultants. Pr. Ev led several retreats including one at which we focused on the 'Sacraments', including foot washing (a part of my Church of the Brethren heritage).

Pr. Ev retired and Pastor David was called to be senior Pastor. I was honored to serve on the committee that called Pr. Jon to serve as Associate Pastor. As the committee met to select from the three candidates I felt the very presence of the Holy Spirit there guiding us. Eight years later Pr, David accepted a call to San Marcos Lutheran and we called Pr. Jon to be our senior Pastor. Pr. Jon led CLC as we came to envision a new Fellowship Hall. A little over a year ago we called Pr. Cyndi Jones as Associate Pastor who helps us understand the needs of our neighbors.

Over the years we made many friends. There were CLC camping weekends, where everyone was served the (consecrated) communion elements around a Sunday morning campfire. There were Bible study programs, Dinners 4/8, Heritage dinners, Talent shows, Thursday night dinners, Picnics at the Beach, Small Group ministries, Stephen Ministry and now the mid-month Bible study. So here we are today.

It's been a very good 50 years and we are blessed. Please celebrate with us!

Mid-month Bible study continues in December and into 2022

Every year I display my Crèche for the Advent, Christmas and Epiphany seasons. I carefully place the Holy family by the manger, the shepherds, the angels, the wise men and the animals in their accustomed places. Then I spend the seasons in wonderment over the birth of God's Holy child. I'm sure you do much the same thing.

But wait, does my Crèche really tell the story of Jesus' birth as Mathew and Luke tell it? Join us and find out.

In November we studied the birth narrative as presented in Matthew. We learned that Jesus was about 2 years old when the Holy family was visited by the (Gentile) wisemen in their house in

Bethlehem. We learned that Joseph, Mary and Jesus escaped King Herod's wrath by escaping to Egypt. And also when they returned from Egypt the family relocated to Nazareth. On Wednesday, Dec.15 we will study the Birth of the Messiah as presented by Luke. This is the version with the census, the manger, the shepherds and the annunciation by the heavenly host. We will also meet on Sunday, Dec.12 (Matthew) and Sunday, Dec.19 (Luke) for another chance to study the birth narratives. We will gather at 10:30 in room 1 of Luther hall. To prepare please read Ch. 1 & 2. Please bring your Bible.
